


The opioid epidemic has occurred in three waves in Wisconsin and nationally.

Wave 1 – prescription opioids


Wave 2 – heroin


Wave 3 – fentanyl and other synthetic opioids







Wisconsin Drug Overdose Deaths Dashboard, 2014 -2020

What is an overdose fatality review?

A locally based, multi-disciplinary process for understanding risk factors and circumstances leading to fatal overdoses and identifying opportunities to prevent future overdoses.

Typical team membership includes:

- Public health
- Law enforcement (municipal police and/or sheriff)
- Coroner or medical examiner
- Emergency medical services
- Corrections
- District attorney's office
- Behavioral health and substance use disorder treatment providers
- Individuals with lived experience
- Healthcare



OFR purpose

OFRs utilize a systematic, multi-disciplinary review process to prevent future overdose fatalities through improvement in organizational policy or practice or refinement of public policies or systems' operations to enhance community health and safety.

Goals of OFR


To better understand the nature of overdose fatalities through comprehensive information sharing

To develop innovative, **proactive** responses


To **strategically** focus limited enforcement and intervention activities on identifiable risks

OFR principle

Overdose fatalities are preventable.



Overdose fatalities are about more than individual behaviors



OFR Recommendations

Types of recommendations

LOCAL

Strategies to improve communication and coordination across agencies

Training opportunities

Update and streamline agency policies and procedures

Identify gaps in service or barriers to care for people with substance use disorder

STATE

Policy changes for state agencies

Changes to the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program

Improved monitoring of programs or services for individuals with SUD

* An OFR State Advisory Group receives statelevel recommendations from OFR teams

Examples of local recommendations

Increase the number of mental health clinicians who are competent in providing integrated mental health and substance use services.

Increase the number of positive/sober housing options with that will accept people with criminal records and previous drug offenses.

Individuals, particularly children, who witness a fatal overdose, or the investigation of a fatal overdose should be connected to support services to address the trauma experienced.

Expand social supports for people in recovery by offering a mentorship program to people newly released from jail.

Offer training on trauma informed care, peer support, mental health, and substance use to law enforcement and EMS.

Increase use of and access to peer recovery coaches for persons who are at high risk of overdose deaths through coordination of services and cross-system approaches (EMS/ED, law enforcement, post release from jail, friend/family after OD death).
